AFFORDABLE

University of the Pacific is a private institution in Stockton, California, that provides financial aid, including new merit scholarships, need-based grants and reduced tuition for our working-adult student population. We also offer state and federal monies.

COMMITTED

Our Transfer Team is dedicated to helping you successfully transition to Pacific. We offer Transfer Admission Agreements, accept Transfer Associate Degrees, and have articulation agreements available to help make your transfer as smooth as possible.

PERSONAL

Our Transfer Team will work with you individually to evaluate your unofficial transcripts from all previous colleges/universities attended and develop a Student Educational Plan specifically designed to help determine the next steps in your transfer process.

University of the Pacific uses rolling admissions. Application deadlines are:

July 21

Fall Semester

Some of Pacific's competitive majors may require an earlier submission date. Please contact the Transfer Team at transfer@pacific.edu for additional information.

Prospective transfer students who have been fully certified by the California Community Colleges system as having completed the CSU-GE or IGETC General Education requirements will have all Pacific lower-division General Education fulfilled, except for major-specific course requirements.

All courses considered for transfer credits must be taken at a regionally accredited institution with a grade of "C" or better. For additional information on transfer coursework, please visit the University's ROAR (Roam Online Articulation Report) website.

- APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION (No application fee)**
Visit [go.Pacific.edu/Apply](https://go.pacific.edu/Apply) for the necessary application links. Please note that University of the Pacific also accepts the Common Application; visit CommonApp.org.
- PERSONAL STATEMENT (Optional)**
Not required but highly recommended, especially if there are any downturns or gaps in your academic history.
- OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS**
Submit your official transcripts from ALL colleges and universities attended. Please note that the university can complete the initial review process with unofficial transcripts.
- LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION (Optional)**
Not required but highly recommended. The letter of recommendation should come from someone who can attest to your commitment to attaining a four-year college degree. The letter can be from an instructor, counselor, supervisor, pastor, etc.
- CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC APPLICANTS ONLY**
An audition is required as part of the admission process, except for those applying to the music industry studies program.

TRANSFER ROUTES

OPTION 1

If you have fewer than 30 transferable units, you will need to submit your high school transcripts for consideration, in addition to your official college and/or university transcripts.

OPTION 2

If you have completed more than 30 transferable units, you will only need to submit official transcripts showing completed college coursework from all colleges or universities previously attended. The recommended entry grade point average is 2.7 or higher. However, some programs may require a higher level of academic achievement.

If you are a working adult student, we will consider your entire body of work; however, grade trends and a current semester's worth of work will be considered in the overall admission decision. For any term(s) of coursework that may not reflect your true ability, we encourage you to submit a personal statement with your application to explain.

Transfer credit FAQs

What is the maximum number of completed community college transferable units accepted by University of the Pacific?

A maximum of 70 community college units will transfer to Pacific. Any community college units completed above this maximum will be awarded "course or subject credit" by Pacific; however, the units for the class will not transfer.

Do I need to have a Transfer Admission Agreement (TAA) to be admitted to the university?

No. It is not necessary to have a Transfer Admission Agreement to be admitted to Pacific. Having that agreement is a guaranteed admittance, but we highly recommend prospective students work with our Transfer Team for help with pre-admission advising, application and financial aid processes, New Student Orientation and enrollment.

Can my completed units be evaluated before applying for admission?

Absolutely! The Transfer Team is here to help answer any of your questions.

NOTES

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

A minimum of nine courses is required to complete the General Education requirements. Three in each of the major categories totaling a minimum of 30-semester units. Students must take one course in each of the six areas listed under Categories I and II. In Category III, students have the option of choosing one course from each of the three areas or two courses from area A and one course from area B. All grades earned must be a “C” or better.

You will find a checklist (see below) for the university’s General Education requirements. You do NOT need to complete these requirements before transferring. The

courses may be taken at other institutions if approved for CSU-GE or IGETC General Education requirements. Typically, General Education course credit earned from a regionally accredited college or university is transferable to Pacific.

Also, no more than two courses from a single department can be taken in any one category; no more than three courses from a single department can be taken in the entire program. Please note that all General Education courses must be completed with a grade of “C” or better.

Computer Science

Minh Pham was one of the School of Engineering and Computer Science's valedictorians for 2019. Upon graduation, he was hired by the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratories as a software developer. But Pham experienced some twists and turns on his road to success.

He began his journey in 2003 when he entered San Joaquin Delta College as a first-generation college student. He attended on and off for the next 10 years, finally dropping out when life made attending too difficult. In 2013, he re-enrolled at Delta, determined to succeed at computer science.

Pham transferred to Pacific in 2016 and jumped into the university's and the engineering school's many activities while working on his bachelor's degree. He was a member of the honor societies Alpha Sigma Lambda, Phi Kappa Phi and IEEE-Eta Kappa Nu, and the professional society, Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers.

Pham attributes his success at Pacific to the community of people that helped him along the way, including the SUCCESS TRIO program, which provides services for first-generation students. His future goal is to start a tech company in Stockton and promote STEM education for all students regardless of race and gender.

Wajiha Tahir first considered attending Pacific while she was a student at San Joaquin Delta College. Her cousin suggested she apply for the Community Involvement Program, which is a need-based program for first-generation college students from the Stockton area. The more Tahir visited the campus and learned about Pacific's student-centered culture, the more she fell in love with the university. Now a financial product analyst at Bloomberg LP, she was proud to have attended Pacific because of its history, prestige and diversity.

For Tahir, succeeding at Pacific required stepping out of her comfort zone and getting involved in the campus's many activities. She stayed on campus after class to study and socialize. She made the effort to get to know her professors and ask for help when she needed it. She took advantage of the Career Resource Center to refine her resume, borrow clothes and use its offices for interviews. She held marketing jobs at both Stockton's Lincoln Center and Lodi's Wine and Roses event center.

Wajiha felt empowered to give back to others like herself while attending Pacific. She and six other Eberhardt School of Business students founded the Pacific Society of Women in Business to give women on campus the skills they need to be successful in their work and their personal lives.

English

Shane Armstrong came to Pacific expecting to work hard, but then, he's used to hard work. Armstrong served four years in an Army airborne infantry unit, including 13 months in Afghanistan. After that, he got a job at a trucking company working 60 hours a week in a parts shop.

Eight years after Armstrong left the military, he attended community college then transferred to Pacific. He said the resources Pacific provides to transfer students, particularly veterans, made the transition easy for him. He now volunteers as sergeant-at-arms for the Pacific Military and Veteran Student Support Center, which hosts activities and services for veterans and active military personnel. His tuition was covered through the GI Bill.

Armstrong also said it was easy to get to know his fellow students and professors at Pacific because the class sizes are small and group work is encouraged.

Armstrong is now finishing his English degree and enrolled in the Gladys L. Benerd School of Education, where he is on his way to becoming a high school wrestling coach and English teacher.





VETERAN STUDENT SUPPORT

The Veteran Student Support Center is dedicated to ensuring that every military and veteran student is fully integrated into campus life and can take advantage of the intellectual and cultural activities offered at Pacific. These are awarded to academically exceptional transfer students who are accepted for admission to Pacific. You don't have to file the FAFSA to be considered, and there is no separate application to complete. Scholarship monies can only be used for tuition.

TYPES OF AID AVAILABLE:

Academic scholarships are awarded based on your transferrable unit college GPA at the time of admission.

Grants are need-based awards that you do not have to repay as long as you maintain eligibility.

Loans must be repaid, unlike grants and scholarships.

Need-based aid is determined by your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or California Dream Act Application; such aid includes institutional need-based grants, the Federal Pell Grant, Cal Grant, and loans. Also, Pacific participates in the Federal Work Study Program.
