## **Two Pacific Alumni Honored by Skoll Foundation; Awarded Grants for Social Entrepreneurship**

Sakena Yacoobi '77 has been awarded a grant of \$480,000 over three years from the Skoll Foundation. Yacoobi, who was on campus in April, founded the Afghan Institute of Learning (AIL) in 1995 to restore education and health programs in Afghanistan that were dramatically cut during 30 years of warfare. The organization's 18 Women's Learning Centers provide services to more than 350,000 Afghan women and children each year. Its 16 Educational Learning Centers have trained 10,000 teachers and have provided school supplies to thousands of young Afghan students, while its university has prepared 125 students for careers as community leaders. AIL plans to expand its teacher training programs and its partnership network to 100 new community-based organizations, ultimately training 3,300 new teachers and improving the health of 500,000 women and children.

In 2005, Martin Burt '80 was awarded a grant of \$515,000 over three years from the Skoll Foundation as well. Burt was recently honored at the 2006 Skoll World Forum on Social Entrepreneurship at Oxford University in England. After studying at Pacific, Burt returned to Paraguay in 1985 and started Fundación Paraguaya, which has supported 30,000 microentrepreneurs who have created 19,000 new jobs. Its Junior Achievement program has helped build the entrepreneurial skills of more than 50,000 young people. Two years ago, the organization took over a bankrupt agricultural school and turned it into a model enterprise that helps young people learn to think of themselves not as "poor campesinos" but as "rural entrepreneurs." With funding from Skoll, the organization will educate 120 students each year and help them apply their skills on family farms. It will also work with at least 45 more schools, including eight that will copy the entire model.
