The moment I stepped onto this campus, I was welcomed by a community that believed in my potential and was deeply committed to helping me achieve my goals. # What are you excited to share about the work your company is doing?

Ambrose: pRxcision started with a bold question: What if we could give every clinician the power to make the right antibiotic choice — instantly? Our mission is to reduce clinician burnout, restore clarity to complexity and deliver better outcomes for patients who can't afford delay.

Linnet: As a pharmacy director, I experienced the pressure of sterile compounding inspections. I started building these Al products to satisfy my own needs. Seeing the benefits, such as dramatic time savings, accuracy and stress relief, led me to start Pharmacycompounding.ai to help other pharmacists. In the last quarter alone, we've experienced a tenfold increase in usage.

Ogbru: As a clinical pharmacist, I saw how long it took to find the right information.

AINGENS was born out of a need to simplify research. With MACg, users can access over 37 million citations, in seconds, to generate dynamic content.

### How have you seen Al transform patient care?

Ambrose: Al identified a patient with multidrug-resistant pneumonia. Within minutes, the care team shifted the therapy and the patient survived the infection. That's not theoretical; that's what happens when the right information reaches the right hands in real time.

Linnet: Al was used to confirm a critical calculation for a patient in heart failure who needed to start medication right away. The calculation was performed instantly and accurately. This helped defuse the stress of the situation and get the drug to the patient more quickly.

"Al does not replace the clinician's view from the foot of the hospital bed. That moment — human, holistic, full of context — will always matter most. The best Al honors that perspective and makes it stronger."

### How has your pharmacy background been an asset?

Ambrose: My background in clinical pharmacy is more than relevant, it's the engine. I know what it means to stand at a patient's bedside — to weigh options when time is short and stakes are high. I also understand the transformative power of data when it is distilled, timely and relevant.

Ogbru: It gives me a deep understanding of the health care system, patient-care challenges and practical issues pharmacists face. These insights are invaluable when designing advanced, customized Al systems that integrate seamlessly into pharmacy workflows.

## What exciting opportunities does Al present for the field of pharmacy?

Ambrose: The future of pharmacy will be powered by intelligence — human and artificial. We can now tailor decisions in real time, detect safety risks before they escalate and help clinicians make sense of massive, shifting data. Al will never replace the human insight required to weigh risk, explain complexity or advocate for a patient. But it can make pharmacists more powerful as trusted clinical decision-makers. For decades, pharmacists have been the stewards of safe and effective medication use. Now, we can become architects of data-driven care.

Linnet: Every day, I see pharmacists complete work in minutes that would have taken hours. We should embrace AI as a continually evolving tool that enhances our ability to deliver better patient care, as well as alleviate stress and workload.

### INNOVATION OFFERS HOPE

in opioid crisis

For patients facing an opioid overdose, timing is everything. Naloxone, a life-saving antidote, usually works for only 30 to 90 minutes, but fentanyl, a powerful synthetic opioid, can linger in the body for hours. **Mamoun M. Alhamadsheh**, PhD, professor of pharmaceutical chemistry, and his team have found a way to extend that window for at least seven days.

"This technology represents a new frontier in drug delivery systems," said Dr. Alhamadsheh. "Its ability to extend the duration of action of small molecules, such as naloxone, could save lives in acute opioid emergencies and be applied to a wide range of therapeutic areas."

Their breakthrough, published in Nature Communications, introduces a first-of-its-kind delivery platform derived from Acoramidis, a Food and Drug Administration-approved drug co-discovered by Dr. Alhamadsheh in collaboration with Isabella A. Graef, MD, CEO of Shenandoah Therapeutics and former Stanford University faculty member. This new system forms a depot under the skin, releasing naloxone gradually and precisely for at least one week from a single injection, dramatically surpassing the one-hour window provided by conventional doses.

Leading the charge alongside Dr. Alhamadsheh was **Hala Aldawod** '24, PhD, a postdoctoral fellow and first author of the study.

"Knowing our work could save lives, particularly among vulnerable populations, drives my passion for innovation," Dr. Aldawod said. "This work gave me a deeper sense of purpose and showed me how science can directly change and save lives."

The contributions of fellow Pacific researchers and co-first authors **Arjun Patel '24**, PharmD, PhD and **Rasha Emara '25**, PhD were integral to advancing this breakthrough. The project was supported in part by a \$1.7 million grant from the National Institutes of Health.

As the opioid crisis continues to affect communities across the country, this new approach offers a powerful tool for long-term protection. It's a reminder of what's possible when research, innovation and purpose come together to shape the future of patient care.

For nearly two decades, the word "Medicare" has echoed through the halls of Pacific. Since 2007, more than 800 doctor of pharmacy (PharmD) students have dedicated countless hours to learning drug plans, counseling patients, navigating the complexities of Medicare Part D and performing medication therapy management. In 2022, Pacific's nationally recognized program entered a new chapter with the launch of a mentormentee program designed to provide PharmD students with knowledge, support and expertise as they pursue their career goals.

Through the Medicare Mentor-Mentee program, students participate in curriculum vitae review, mock interviews and one-on-one mentorship. What sets this program apart is its personalized approach. Each student is thoughtfully paired with a pharmacist whose experience aligns with their career goals, whether that means entering the workforce or pursuing a residency or fellowship. For students interested in specialized residency training, the mentorship begins as they enter clinical rotations and continues over the course of eight months. During this time, the mentor-mentee pair engages in discussions that range from case presentations and journal clubs to writing a strong letter of intent and navigating work-life balance.

"The longitudinal mentorship that participating alumni provide to students interested in pursuing a residency or fellowship is invaluable," said **Rajul A. Patel '01, '06**, PharmD, PhD, professor of pharmacy practice. "They better position our students for success by sharing their knowledge and experience through every step, including who to reach out to for letters of recommendation, how to write a compelling personal statement, clinical practice questions, interview tips and more. I believe students who participate in this initiative feel more comfortable and confident as a result of their involvement."

As a student, **Adesuwa Aigbuza '25**, PharmD knew pursuing a postgraduate residency would be a competitive path. Thanks to her participation in the program, she didn't have to walk that journey alone.

Dr. Aigbuza successfully matched with a PGY1 acute care residency at University of California, San Francisco (UCSF). She credits much of that success to the mentorship she received.

"As a mentee, my Pacific experience has been positively impacted in the best way," she shared. "I was able to receive impactful advice about the residency process and the pharmacy field in general. These tips and tricks allowed me to be very successful in securing the next step in my career."

Among the many meaningful conversations she had with her mentor, one left a lasting impression.

"I was feeling conflicted about which path to pursue within pharmacy," she recalled. "During a phone call, my mentor and I talked deeply about both my long-term and short-term goals. I'll never forget what she said to me: 'Keep an open mind about anything and everything. You are in the perfect position to learn many things. Don't close yourself off so early.' That advice shifted my mindset. From that point forward, I gave everything a try during my Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experience rotations, and I'll carry that openness into my residency."

On the other side of the conversation was **May (Chen) Lui '16, '20**, PharmD, MS a clinical pharmacist specializing in ambulatory care. Since earning her doctor of pharmacy from Pacific in 2016, Dr. Lui has mentored pharmacy students informally and formally through the Medicare program.

"I remembered how much I relied on mentors during my own APPE year," Dr. Lui said. "The decisions felt so heavy because they impacted the trajectory of my career. I want to be a sounding board for students and provide honest insight about today's pharmacy landscape."

Dr. Lui's proudest moment as a mentor came when she found out Dr. Aigbuza had matched at UCSF.

"It was such a proud moment! Knowing that I played even a small part in her journey made everything worth it."

As a medical science liaison in oncology at Boehringer Ingelheim, **Utsav Patel '16**, PharmD is passionate about empowering students to network and explore career opportunities in the pharmaceutical industry.



# RURAL ROOTS to TRANSFORMATIVE

As the only son, he spent much of his childhood dutifully working alongside his father, toiling in the hot sun as they tended their family vineyard.

The words of his father motivated him to pursue higher education. His father once said, "If you don't study hard and do well in school, you'll end up right here helping me on the farm when you get older."

With a keen interest in science and a quiet determination to explore opportunities beyond his rural upbringing, Kobayashi found his way to pharmacy.

He earned his bachelor of science in pharmacy and his master of science in pharmaceutical sciences from Pacific. He credits his faculty advisor, the late Professor Emeritus **James C. King**, PhD, for laying the foundation for a remarkable career in pharmacy.

"Dr. King established the first clinical pharmacy experience with San Joaquin General Hospital," said Kobayashi.
"This allowed pharmacy students to make rounds on the hospital floor alongside other health care students.
Dr. King also helped me navigate my career goals while I was pursuing my graduate education."

Starting out in the pharmaceutical industry in dosage form design, Kobayashi quickly distinguished himself with his technical skill and problemsolving mindset. His career evolved into commercial manufacturing and ultimately into quality assurance, where he was responsible for upholding the quality of clinical and commercial products.

After stepping back from the pharmaceutical industry, Kobayashi launched Kobayashi and Associates, LLC, which offers quality assurance and compliance services to emerging biotechnology companies.

"Quality and compliance is the same whether you are developing a proof of concept or taking a product to market," he said. "In every case, the underlying goal is improving medical care."

For more than 15 years, Kobayashi has championed Pharmaceutical and Chemical Sciences Program (PCSP) graduate students who have had the opportunity to present their research at national or international conferences. This year, the travel stipend was transformed into a Powell-matched endowed scholarship by his sons, Scott and Jeff.

Reflecting on his own experiences, he views professional conferences as powerful catalysts for connection and professional growth.

"My hope is this scholarship allows students to meet people and network, explore research or employment opportunities," he said. "And have a good time, too." As an undergraduate student at Pacific, Kobayashi spent summers and holidays behind a counter at a local pharmacy where he gained first-hand experience working with patients.

"When I came to pharmacy school,
I was pretty naive about everything.
I had never been behind the prescription counter. Now, I want to help students get behind their own counters and see what's out there."

Kobayashi helps shape the education of future pharmaceutical scientists by serving on the PCSP Industrial Advisory Board, where he shares crucial industry insights and offers guidance on curriculum changes. He also maintains strong ties to Pacific as an active brother of the Gamma Nu chapter of the Kappa Psi pharmaceutical fraternity and by serving on the Kappa Psi - Gamma Nu Education Foundation board of directors.

### **A SHARED LEGACY**

of discovery and growth

Flashing lights, beeping monitors and the pounding footsteps of health care professionals responding to a code blue - Allyson Chan '23, PharmD thrives in this environment.

Through a PGY1 pharmacy residency and a PGY2 cardiology residency at Loma Linda University, she discovered that she remains calm and collected in highintensity situations.

"After being exposed to clinical pharmacy and the opportunity to pursue residency, I realized I am passionate about acute care inpatient medicine and I enjoy being involved in the interdisciplinary team, as well as being hands-on and at bedside for emergent situations such as codes and intubations," she said.

In July, she joined Scripps Mercy Hospital San Diego as a clinical pharmacist, working primarily in the cardiology and intensive care unit.

In contrast, her father, William K. Chan, PharmD, PhD, professor of pharmaceutical sciences, is at home in the hushed quiet of his research lab, tucked away in the lower level of Edward and Alice Long Memorial Hall. Unwavering focus and steadfast resolve have sustained him for over three decades. Since 1993, Dr. William Chan has been studying the aryl hydrocarbon receptor and has been awarded seven National Institutes of Health (NIH) grants. This receptor, activated by the environmental contaminates encountered in daily life, plays a key role in regulating immune response and cell growth, making it a prime candidate for innovative drug development.

"I hope to discover useful knowledge about this receptor so that new, effective drugs can be created for the treatment of diseases," he said.

Since 1996, Dr. William Chan has been a pillar of the pharmacy faculty. As a

student at Pacific, his daughter witnessed first-hand his commitment to teaching.

"I admire the way he is not only knowledgeable, but he goes out of his way to help students learn and he is bold about his faith," she said. "I want to be just like that - to excel in my job, but to also be a light to those around me and to consider the needs of others before my own."

In turn, he expressed the pride he feels: "Allyson is gifted in academics and is passionate about clinical pharmacy practice. I admire her ability to handle stress with ease and always perform at a high level with a contagious smile."

Like the Chans, Rajesh "Raj" Patel '87, PhD, and his daughter, **Anika Patel** '21, PharmD, PhD, share a strong bond through pharmacy. Their connection is rooted in pharmaceutical research. While interning at her father's company

in high school, she gained first-hand experience in drug development as the team worked on the first implantable drug to deliver long-lasting medication to treat opioid dependency. In 2016, Probuphine™ received Food and Drug Administration approval.

"It's a very cool thing to say your dad has a drug on the market," she said. "But what really inspires me is the fact that even after reaching that endpoint, he wasn't done. He kept going. Now he's trying to work on other disease states and other types of addictions. With drug development, there's so many new things that still need to be developed, and the fact that we keep going is so important. That really pushes me to want to make a difference and, hopefully, do more research in cancer therapeutics and, ultimately, improve the lives of patients."

In February, ReacX Pharmaceuticals, where Dr. Rajesh Patel serves as chief operating officer, announced it had received a three-year, \$10.35 million NIH grant. In his role as principal investigator, Dr. Rajesh Patel will lead efforts to advance the clinical development of a six-month implant utilizing Proneura™, the proprietary drug delivery platform used to prevent opioid addiction relapse.

Thirty-eight years after her father crossed the stage to accept his diploma, Dr. Anika Patel earned her doctor of philosophy in pharmaceutical sciences from Chapman University School of Pharmacy. Graduating with distinction, she received the James L. Doti Outstanding Graduate Student Award, the university's highest honor for graduate students. Her father also drew attention to the four peer-reviewed publications she co-authored during graduate school.

Driven by purpose and inspired by each other, these fathers and daughters are transforming patient care.

### Anthony P. Morreale

**Waiting in silent anticipation** as two full grown tigers approach a watering hole, two young cubs in tow. Fine tuning a formulary, knowing a veteran's wellbeing hangs in the balance.

Though worlds apart, wildlife photography and patient care advocacy demand the same core traits: patience, tenacity and the ability to anticipate direction. These qualities are found in Alumnus of the Year Anthony P. Morreale '83, PharmD, MBA, CPEL, BCPS, FASHP. He and his wife, Suzanne Morreale '85, PharmD, are passionate wildlife photographers who have explored more than 135 countries.

"I see this recognition as a testament to the collaborations and successes of hundreds of my colleagues who worked closely with me in so many different settings over decades," said Dr. Morreale.

His colleague, Helen K. Park '99, PharmD, BCPS, FCPHA, FCSHP, shared:

"Over the past several decades, Dr. Morreale has made tremendous contributions to the profession of pharmacy and has been instrumental in advancing pharmacy practice in multiple practice settings. After meeting Dr. Morreale, it is hard to walk away without feeling motivated and excited about the pharmacy profession. Those of us who

attest that his energy is infectious, his dedication to pharmacy is admirable and his ability to move pharmacy forward is aspirational."

and leadership roles at the VA San Diego Healthcare System from 1985 until 2010, when he was selected to create the Clinical Pharmacy Practice Office for the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in Washington, D.C. He served in that role until his retirement in late 2024.

His efforts to utilize pharmacists transformative \$120 million grant from

Office of Rural Health (ORH) added 175 advanced practice pharmacists to health care teams throughout the VA, placing medication experts in prime positions to provide expertise for veterans with pain management or mental health needs. In 2019, a \$25 million grant from ORH expanded clinical pharmacy services for substance abuse disorders. He and his team also established the VA's first centralized anticoagulation hub, and four years later secured \$10 million to expand nationwide.

Another significant contribution was his role in the spread of pharmacoeconomics and the creation of a national formulary system. Prior to its implementation, each of the roughly 150 VA sites had their own formulary. Standardizing the formulary process helped ensure all veterans had access to high quality treatments. Beyond dramatically improving patient outcomes and equity, the initiative generated substantial cost savings.

He and his team received the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP) Best Practice Award in 2008 and 2024. Dr. Morreale has been recognized as a Fellow and Certified Pharmacy Executive Leader by ASHP. His notable honors include the American Pharmacists "I see this recognition as a testament to the collaborations and successes of hundreds of my colleagues who worked closely with me in so many different settings over decades."

The Morreales recently established the Powell-matched Anthony and Suzanne Morreale Endowed Scholarship for Advancing Clinical Pharmacy and Veteran Care.
